

# Certificate of Advanced Study in French

## Statement of Intention

With the Certificate of Advanced Study in Foreign Language and Literature or Area Studies the College recognizes satisfactory completion of the equivalent of a minor field of specialization in the indicated language.

Requirements for the Certificate of Advanced Study in French are: six courses completed with a grade of C- or better in French beyond 103. French 204 may count toward the certificate. (Students who place out of 204 are still required to complete the six-course requirement.) At least two upper-level literature courses (300-395) are required. No more than 18 credits from non-Carleton Off-Campus Studies programs may be applied toward the certificate.

In order to be certified as having fulfilled the requirements, students must submit an application listing courses completed and intended no later than Fall of the senior year. Applications are available in the department offices. This is not the application; it is only a statement of intention that we will use in the department.\* Fill this form out ONLY IF YOU ARE PLANNING ON PURSUING THE CERTIFICATE.
