ONGOING ART EVENTS

October 22 through November 18: War Work: Artists Engage Iraq and Other Wars features the work of artists Sandow Birk, Combat Paper Project, Daniel Heyman, John Risseeuw, Ehren Tool, and Megan Vossler. As the Iraq War winds down, artists invite reflection on this and other wars. These six artists, through drawing, printmaking and hand-made paper production, and ceramics, challenge audiences not to forget the consequences of global armed conflict. Art Gallery. Through October 17: In Between: Works by Kelly Connole and Beth Lo, features the work of two ceramic artists, who both delight in story-telling and artistic experimentation. Connole create hybrid beats that capture trains between species. Lo, the illustrator of several children's books, explores her Chinese American heritage through installations of tiny ceramic figures and through mixed-media collages. Through October 30: Monumental Ideas in Miniature Books, features more than 140 handmade artists' books. The pieces incorporate a variety of ideas, images, techniques, and interpretations of bookmaking. The books are distinguished by their diminutive scale: each of the books is small enough to fit into the palm of the hand. Some of the books are interactive and can be folded, expanded, or opened in imaginative ways.
