Carleton and Anti-Racism: Updates and Opportunities for Alumni

Carleton is committed to improving campus life for students who are Black, indigenous, or people of color through systemic and long-term change. The Board of Trustees at a special meeting on August 28 endorsed the creation of a Community Plan for Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity at Carleton, with a special focus on Black experiences. Trustee Jeninne McGee '85 and Professor Chico Zimmerman recently agreed to co-chair the planning effort, which will include inclusive processes to provide students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents, and friends across the college community the opportunity to add their voices and views.

Here are the most recent updates on what the college is doing and how to get involved:

- Learn about the U.S. Department of Education's \$1.4 million TRIO/Student Support Services (SSS) grant to help Carleton support 140 students who come from lowincome backgrounds, who are the first in their family to attend college, or who have a documented disability.

Dr. Spencer Crew is the Interim Director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture. Dr. Crew will discuss the obligations of history museums to advance the work of social justice. Registration is required.
