Most indicators reflect the official statistics reported by Carleton to the U.S. Department of Education or on the "Common Data Set" of information collected by the major college guidebooks. Except as noted, the contents reflect numbers as of the fall of the 2015-16 academic year or final figures from the previous academic or fiscal year.

We present a common source of official statistics to reduce the confusion and errors that can arise from multiple local interpretations of Carleton's data. At the same time, although the numbers presented here use the most standard national definitions, other interpretations may be possible and legitimate, depending upon the timing of a report, or different methodologies required for different surveys or reporting needs. *To avoid misrepresenting the College, members of the Carleton community who respond to external surveys and data requests are encouraged to consult with Institutional Research and Assessment if there are questions about data or data definitions.*

The comprehensive fee discount rate (scholarships/gross tuition, fee, room & board revenue) was 29.7%.

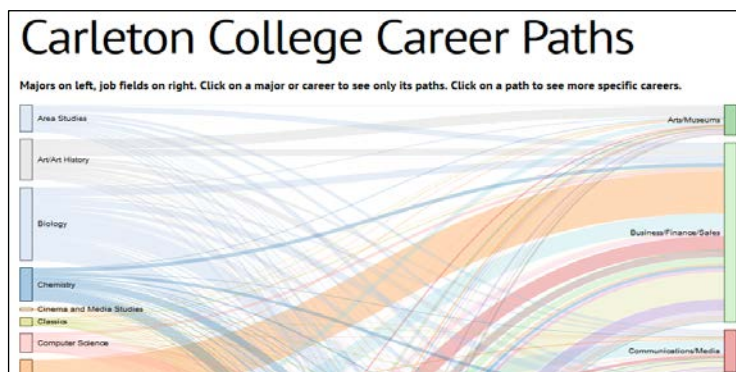

In cooperation with several universities, Carleton offers programs in engineering and law that extend beyond the normal four years of undergraduate work. Students spend three years at Carleton and then two or three years at the professional school.

[Law and Medical School](#)

Carleton offers advising and resources for students considering law and medical school. In the most recent five-year period, an average of 73% of applicants (current students and recent alumni) were accepted to medical schools, and 87% to law school. These rates are well above recent national average acceptance rates of about 45% for medical schools, and 74% for law schools.

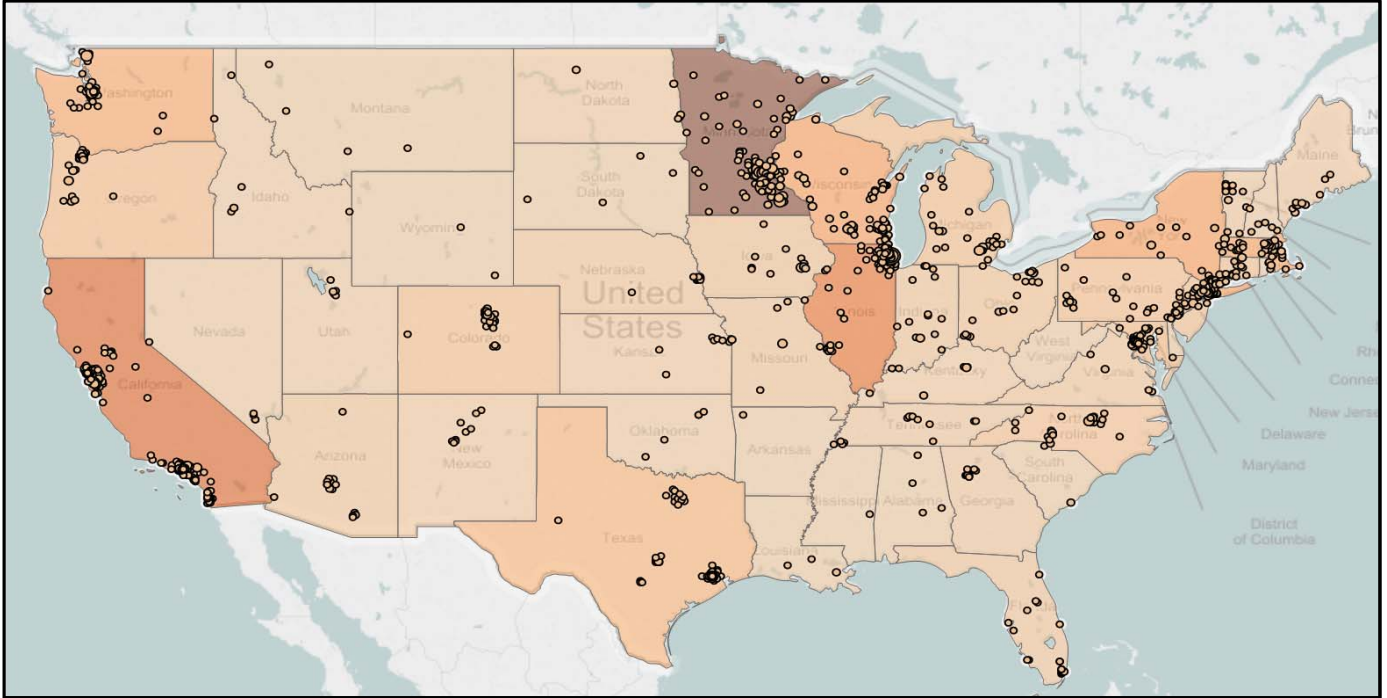

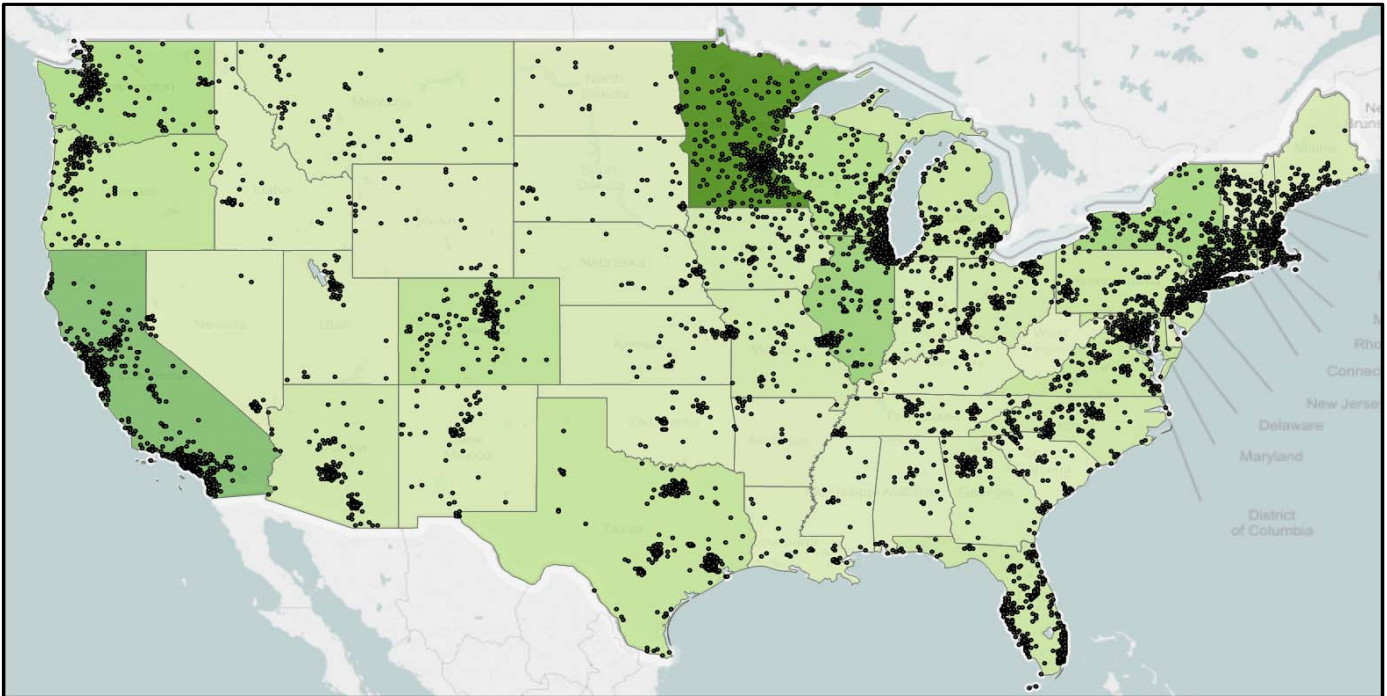
US Geographic Distribution (Continental US Only)
